ANCESTOR'S SERVICE.

"Section 1. Any man shall be eligible to membership in the Society who, being of the age of twenty-one years or over, and a citizen of good repute in the community, is the lineal descendant of an ancestor who was at all times unflinching in his loyalty to, and rendered active service in, the cause of American independence, either as an officer, soldier, seaman, marine, militiaman, or minute man, in the armed forces of the Continental Congress, or of any one of the several Colonies or States, or as a signer of the Declaration of Independence; or as a member of a Committee of Safety or Correspondence; or as a member of any Continental, Provincial, or Colonial Congress or Legislature; or as a recognized patriot who performed actual service by overt acts of resistance to the authority of Great Britain."—Constitution of National Society U. S. A., Article III, Section 1, adopted June 3, 1907.

Membership is based upon one original claim; when the applicant derives eligibility by descent from more than one ancestor, and it is desired to take advantage thereof, separate applications, to be marked "Supplemental Application," should be made in each case and filed with the original.

State fully such documentary or traditional authority as you found the following record upon, and also the residence of ancestors, with dates of birth and death, if known.

By order of the Board of Trustees, May 1, 1911, the recipient of a certificate granted on this application agrees to surrender his certificate upon failure to pay his membership fee, unless his membership shall cease by reason of death or actual disability, to be determined by the Society of which he is a member.

My ancestor's services in assisting in the establishment of American Independence during the War of the Revolution were as follows:

William Wilbur Mitchell served his country as a soldier in the "Continental Line". His name appears on different lists recording the faithful fighters of Georgia. He served in the Battle of Kings Mountain. He was granted several lots of land in Georgia for Revolutionary Service. He died in Carnesville, Georgia, Franklin County.

My sister, Annie Lee Freeman Anderson, by reason of this same ancestor, William Wilbur Mitchell, was accepted as a daughter of the American Revolution—her National Number is 162097—and she is a member of the State Chapter D. A. R. of South Carolina, City Chapter of Chester, Chapter name "Mary Adair".
